RSF Association suspends privileges of two RSF Golf Club members

The Rancho Santa Fe Association voted to suspend the privileges of two RSF Golf Club members who are significantly delinquent on their fees at the July 15 RSF Association board meeting. The members owe upward of \$30,000 each to the golf club.

Steve Comstock, Association chief financial officer, said it was the first time the Association has separately suspended golf club privileges. Usually when a member is delinquent on their Association assessments, the board votes to place a lien on their property and suspends their right to attend the tennis or golf clubs.

In these cases, the members have not paid their dues in years and, additionally, owe sizable amounts for purchases at the pro shop.

The unique nature of the delinquency required a separate action from the board.

"Delinquent charges haven't occurred like this before," Comstock said.

Association Manager Pete Smith said the members have always been given the option to quit the club and stop being additionally billed. Both the delinquent members have chosen not to quit.

The Rancho Santa Fe Association continued to support the California Highway Patrol's Senior Volunteer Patrol and Explorers programs, voting to contribute \$7,000 on July 15. Since 1999, the Association has provided funding for the programs that help out in Rancho Santa Fe by directing school traffic, issuing parking warnings and providing special event traffic control, as they did at this year's Fourth of July parade.

For the last 11 years the Association has given \$3,000 to the seniors and \$1,000 to the Explorers, young adults ages 15 to 20

RSF philanthropist helps fly athletes, coaches to 2010 Special Olympics

•For RSF philanthropists Gary and Maggie Bobileff, 'It's all about the kids'

Just ask Gary Bobileff why he's hired a pilot to fly kids in his private jet, or the reason he and wife Maggie co-chaired the annual Kids Korps Gala, and the answer is steadfast.

"It's all about the kids," stated Bobileff, owner of Bobileff Motorcar Company that specializes in Ferrari and Lamborghini restoration, sales and service. Maggie Bobileff owns and operates a successful line of men's clothing stores in La Jolla and Rancho Santa Fe called Mister B Men's Clothing.

By the time Rancho Santa Fe residents read this edition, Gary Bobileff will be busy with four flights shuttling athletes and coaches from Long Beach to the 2010 Special Olympics

in Lincoln, Nebraska, through Cessna Citation's airlift program.

Bobileff and pilot Roger Nutter, who is also donating his time, made the first round-trip in the seven-seater July 17 and will retrieve their passengers July 24 when the Games end.

Through the program, Citation owners donate their aircraft, time and crew to transport the special Olympians, including this year's honorary chair Harrison Ford who, in a recorded message on Cessna's Website, announced the undertaking as "the largest peacetime airlift in history."

When Bobileff made his first flights for the program for the 2006 Games, 235 Citation owner-operators transported

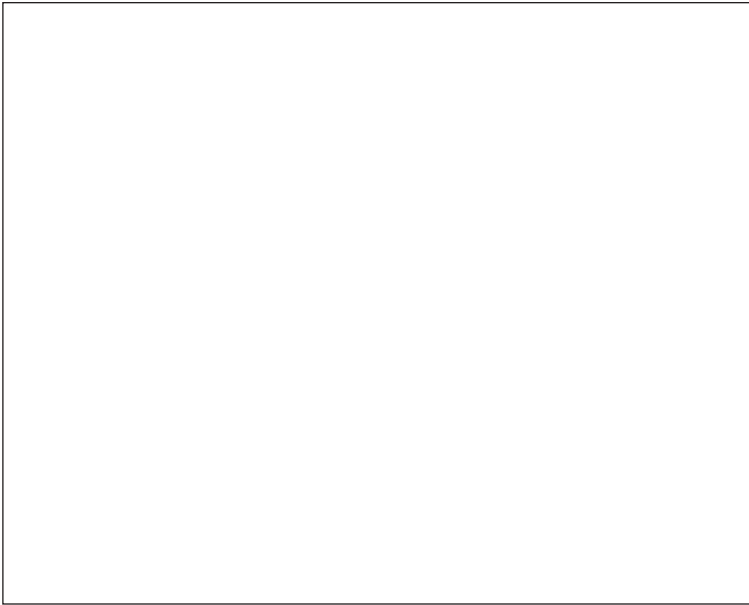
1,500 athletes and coaches. This year, 325 aircraft will transport an estimated 2,000 athletes and coaches.

"This is all done, of course, gratis, for the fact of just doing it because you want to do this sort of thing," Bobileff, 58, said. "It's kind of a cool to see the expression on these kids' faces. They just absolutely flip out when you say, 'Well, you're not just flying there on an airline, but privately,' and wow, that makes a big statement.

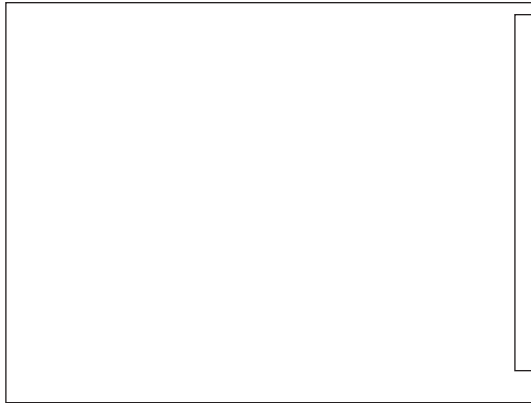
"When they actually get to the event itself, their eyes just light up," he said. "All of a sudden, perhaps for the first time, they feel like they can really accomplish something in their life. It's amazing, it really is."

This is the seventh implementation of Cessna's airlift

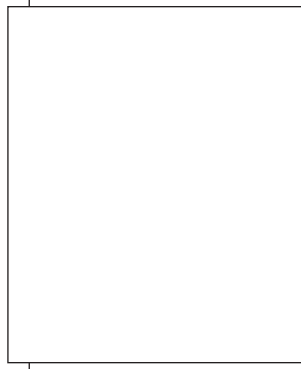
